Woodlawn Cemetery

In 1852 the town purchased two acres of land for a cemetery, and in 1904, it was voted to name it Woodlawn Cemetery. The entrance to the cemetery had an elaborate stone archway, designed in 1906 by Thomas Allen Sr. It was replaced with stone pillars and an iron fence after the arch caught on an extended dump truck killing the driver. After Meetinghouse Cemetery was no longer used for burials Woodlawn became the burial ground used by most of the families in Princeton. Some names of early Princeton residents include Brooks, Goodnow, Mirick, Dana, Eveleth, Blake, and Russell.
