Princeton-Hubbardston Town Line

1830 map: Even before 1830 there were businesses associated with the East Branch of the Ware River on the Princeton-Hubbardston line. These mills continued to produce various products until after the late 1800's. Two names associated with the area in 1830 are the Fay Mills and J.G. Davis.

1870 map: Old Colony Road continued in a westerly direction and converged with Hubbardston Road. It was in this vicinity where Mrs. N. Wilson, S. Roper, M. M. McCormick, Roper Saw Mill, are shown. Also included in this area are: S. Roper, W. Wilson, and __F. Santom. The area was known as Valley Village or Slab City.

1898 map: Businesses and residences continued to exist in this area. Located in Hubbardston, just over the town line, were M.H.O. Murdock, P.J. Johnson, Roper L&B. (Lumber and Box) Co. and a cider mill. In Princeton the map shows A.R., J.R. & A.E. Wilson, the Wm. Roper Residence, T.H. Bartlett, and a Saw, Box and Grist Mill, Roper Lumber and Box Co. and a blacksmith shop. Joyce Anderson, PHC
