

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR SHERRY PATCH'S UPDATE

Happy December! Things are very busy in Princeton. With Special Town Meeting and Thanksgiving behind us, and the Highway Department ready to take on winter, we look forward to 2022 with optimism and community spirit. Town Department Heads have turned in their proposed FY23 budget and capital requests, and the Finance Team is reviewing them as we work towards creating the municipal operating budget for next year. The number one goal of the Finance Team is to create a fiscally responsible budget that ensures that the residents of Princeton get the most out of their hard-earned tax dollars.

We recently received a \$50,000 grant from the <u>Commonwealth of Massachusetts Urban Agenda Grant Program</u> to work with the <u>Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Commission</u> to develop a Phase 1 update of the <u>Town of Princeton Master Plan</u> last updated in 2007. Town officials and volunteers will be working on the development of a community-wide vision for the town including a community survey covering the specific chapters in the master plan and the creation of three new chapters on future Land Use, Economic Development, and Open Space, and Recreation opportunities.

The Housing Production Plan Committee held their "kickoff" meeting in early December to discuss their strategy for planning and development of affordable housing in Princeton. The initial meeting was a success with the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Commission representative sharing a slideshow of necessary components, relevant data, and a timeline for the completion of the housing plan. The committee is excited about the work ahead and plans on submitting the plan to the Commonwealth in the late summer of 2022.

Princeton has received S521,293.51 as part of the S1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) and will receive the same amount in June of next year. The Selectboard is working with the Financial Team to create an ARPA investment plan that prioritizes shared community goals relating to public health, community assistance, and one-time technology, infrastructure, and community project costs. Part of this initiative is asking residents to fill out an <u>opinion survey</u>. If you have not already, please take a moment to fill out the linked survey by 12/20/21. INTERIM SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEMBER APPOINTED

At their November 16, 2021 meeting the Princeton Selectboard interviewed two applicants for a recently vacated term on the Wachusett Regional School District School Committee. The SB appointed Paul Dubois to fill the term for a seat that will be up for election during the May 2022 Annual Town Election. When asked why he chose to submit his name for consideration Mr. DuBois said.

"My heart is in education. I was a high school math teacher at Quabbin Regional High School for ten years. I have been a full-time Academic Coordinator and Instructional Coach for the Math, Science and Wellness department at Quabbin for three years and work with teachers in grades 6-12.

Making department budgets, curating curriculum materials, and helping teachers improve their practice are all important to a student's education. My heart is also with the Wachusett Regional School District. I wanted to take my skills to the Wachusett School Committee because I have three small children (ages 2, 5, and 8). They have had an exceptional experience at Thomas Prince School so far. I wanted to be one of Princeton's voices on the committee for my children as well as all the other children in our wonderful community.

I joined the school committee because I believe in the power of service. Finding a member to join the committee at this time of year can be difficult but the timing was right for me to start to serve. A new member of the school committee would need to get up to speed on many ongoing committees quickly. I am on the Regional Agreement and Legal Affairs subcommittees. I feel like my job has prepared me to hit the ground running."

Conservation Commission

New construction? New driveway? Home addition? Septic repair? The Conservation Commission would like to remind residents that if they have projects like these they hope to start-up in the spring they shouldn't wait too long to apply for wetlands permits. If you think you'll be doing ANY work - large or small - within 100 feet of wetlands, ponds, or streams (or within 200 feet of a larger year-round stream), it's likely you'll need wetlands permit to complete your project.

Please contact us at conservation@town.princeton.ma.us to learn if your project will need a permit or to get any other related questions answered. You may wish to check this <u>online map</u> from the State to see if there are any mapped resources in your area. The wetland mapping is not guaranteed to be accurate or complete, however, so to be sure you should check with us anyway.

One of the primary functions of our volunteer Commission is to ensure that YOUR wetland resources in Princeton are protected through the project review and approval process laid out in the Wetlands Protection Act. It's an important task and we are looking for new members to fill 2 vacancies on our Commission, so if you like the outdoors and have some time to offer your town please consider joining!

From the Office of the Tax Collector

Actual Real Estate and Property Tax Bills will be mailed out in late December, with a due date of Friday, April 1, 2022.

Congratulations to James Dunbar, Treasurer Collector for the Town of Princeton, on renewing his re-designation as a Certified Massachusetts Municipal Treasurer Collector! Mr. Dunbar's renewal was granted to him by the Board of Certification of the state-wide organization of local Tax Collector's and Treasurers Association. Renewal is awarded every five years only to previously Certified candidates who continue to attend the Annual School of the Association held in August of each year at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and who successfully complete courses in municipal law, finance, and administration.

IT STEERING COMMITTEE

The IT Strategic Planning Committee is working on a strategy to ensure that the Town has consistent policies regarding software, hardware and data storage, retention, and recovery.

Current initiatives include:

- Identifying all town data that committees, boards, and departments possess and where this data is stored. The ultimate goal is to ensure that all town data is accessible and can be restored in the event of a catastrophic event.
- Working with the Town Clerk on a plan to digitize all records that are currently in paper format to ensure that they can be recovered if necessary.
- Identifying a common information architecture for data storage on town servers and ultimately, cloud-based storage.
- Providing support when requested on hardware and software evaluation for town departments, committees, etc.
- Acting as liason to the Town IT coordinator

PRINCETON HISTORICAL COMMISSION



The Princeton Historical Commission continues to work on replacement of the Civil War plaques, which were removed from Bagg Hall during recent restoration work. Thanks to an allocation of funds at the spring Town Meeting, and with the help of private donations, we are on track to have the new marble plaques installed in the spring. The local monument company which is carving the names has provided us with proof of the final product for review. We are especially pleased that we are able to attain a hand-chiseled look for a fraction of the price. In other news, at Meetinghouse Cemetery, further repairs to historic markers are wrapping up. Next door, we have installed a sign at the Town Pound on Mountain Road, and encourage everyone to go check out this unique local treasure!

Do You Know Where Your Home Energy Dollars Go?

The Environmental Action Committee is pleased to announce a pilot program with the Princeton Municipal Light Department to help Princeton residents save money and use energy more efficiently.

The program has two components:

- 1. PMLD has purchased several Kill-A-Watt meters which measure the amount of electricity used by specific appliances. You can borrow a Kill-A-Watt meter, plug it in between your wall socket and an appliance, and see how much electricity the appliance requires. Then you can compare your appliance's energy use to your neighbor's, or to other appliances on the market.
- 2. Light Commissioner Richard Chase is allowing his infrared camera to be used by Charlie Cary to take pictures of Princeton homes upon request. These pictures are remarkable at identifying where buildings are losing the most heat.
