Report of the Advisory Board April 28, 2011

The Advisory Board and Board of Selectmen met several times during the fiscal planning process for FY2012. Town Administrator John Lebeaux provided many supporting documents to help in crafting and accepting the overall budget and special article items. We would like to thank John and the Board of Selectman for the many hours that went into putting a very manageable budget together.

While the fiscal outlook for FY2012 remains generally bleak, the budget does include a 2% increase in non union salaries and some capital improvement spending. The Advisory Board approves of the overall operating budget, with the exception of the Police Department salaries line item. We are awaiting additional information, but as written, the salary line item was not accepted.

Funding the Town Building Maintenance account was approved at the same level as in FY 2011, as we foresee roofing repairs to Station 2 and perhaps some work on Bagg Hall. The Board also enthusiastically approves of Article 4, the Green Repair Program, which will provide funding for much needed roof repairs, replacement windows and boiler upgrades to the Thomas Prince School.

The Advisory Board also supports funding the town's Stabilization Fund and the Infrastructure Stabilization Fund for unexpected future needs.

The Advisory Board has yet to render an opinion on the Planning Board articles related to overlay districts and changes to various zoning designations.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds, a sum of money to be expended under the direction of the School Building Committee for repairs and/or replacement of roofs, windows, and/or boilers at the Thomas Prince School, 170 Sterling Road, Princeton. The proposed repair project would materially extend the useful life of the school and preserve an asset that otherwise is capable of supporting the required educational program, and for which the Town may be eligible for a school construction grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority ("MSBA"). The MSBA's grant program is a non-entitlement, discretionary program based on need, as determined by the MSBA, and any project costs the Town incurs in excess of any grant approved by and received from the MSBA shall be the sole responsibility of the Town. Any grant that the Town may receive from the MSBA for the Project shall not exceed the lesser of (1) 52.89 percent (%) of eligible, approved project costs, as determined by the MSBA, or (2) the total maximum grant amount determined by the MSBA.

Approval of this article appropriates the funding to replace roof, boilers, and single-pane windows at the Thomas Prince School through the Massachusetts School Building Authority's Green Repair Program. The Town qualifies for a reimbursement rate of 52.89%

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize that all funds granted to the Town by the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) as reimbursement for the Thomas Prince School Green Building Repair Feasibility Study are applied to the Building Maintenance Program (Account #03-5-192-204).

As required by the MSBA, the Town appropriated its total share of the Feasibility Study prior to the study commencing. The Board of Selectmen accomplished this by dedicating \$24,600 from the Building Maintenance Program. Approval of this article will restore the full value of MSBA's reimbursement (approx. 52%) to the account from which the funds originated.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from the undesignated fund balance (free cash) account # 27-5-999-000 the sum of \$25,000 to the Town Environmental Clean-up Account #03-5-420-201 for ground water monitoring at the former town landfill or take any other action relative thereto.

These funds will be used to continue required groundwater monitoring efforts at the former town landfill. This is a thirty-year effort with DEP oversight.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from the undesignated fund balance (free cash) account #27-5-999-000 the sum of \$45,000 to the Town Environmental Clean-up Account #03-5-420-201 for remedial activity of contaminated soil located at the public safety complex and town hall/library area or take any other action relative thereto.

Recent monitoring activities at the site suggests that contaminated soil excavation and removal is necessary to achieve site closure. This effort is monitored by the Department of Environmental Protection.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish the FY12 ambulance operating budget. Receipts for ambulance services received in FY12 and all subsequent fiscal years to be deposited into a receipt reserved for appropriation account established in FY01. Appropriations from said account to be made at either the annual or special town meetings for the purpose of maintaining and operating the Town's ambulance service, i.e. salary for ambulance employees, vehicle maintenance, fuel, equipment and operating supplies. The requested appropriation for the FY12 ambulance-operating budget is \$48,960.00 for salary and \$43,150.00 for expenses for a total budget of \$92,110.00 any balance in said account to be carried forward to subsequent years, or take any other action relative thereto.

All ambulance department receipts will be accounted for in a receipt reserved for appropriation account, from which ambulance-operating expenses will be paid.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish the FY12 trash operating budget. Receipts for trash disposal services received in FY12 and all subsequent fiscal years to be deposited into a trash enterprise fund account established in FY08. Appropriations from said account to be made at either the annual or special town meetings for the purpose of paying for the proper disposal of solid waste generated within the town. The requested appropriation for the FY12 trash-operating budget is \$80,000.00, of which \$70,000 be appropriated from Solid Waste Enterprise-Receipts Reserved for Appropriation and \$10,000 be appropriated from Solid Waste Enterprise-Available Retained Earnings. Any balance in said account to be carried forward to subsequent years, or take any other action relative thereto.

This article will allow the town to receive payments from trash haulers, which will be deposited into this account. The Town will then pay its invoices directly to Wheelabrator Millbury, Inc. where the trash incinerator is located.

ARTICLE 10: DEPARTMENTAL REVOLVING FUNDS AUTHORIZATION:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize revolving funds for certain town departments under Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 44 Section 53E 1/2 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2010, or take any other action relative thereto.

ADVISORY BOARD APPROVES

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to be used to offset the FY11 Snow and Ice Removal expenses, or take any other action relative thereto.

Town Counsel has determined that it is permissible to address current year (FY11) budget items at the Annual Town Meeting (versus the previous practice of having a separate Special Town Meeting the same date as the Annual Town Meeting). This article relates to addressing the current year (FY11) general fund budget operating deficit. As of 4/11/11, the Snow and Ice Removal expense deficit is \$32,203.52.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to reallocate among certain line items within the FY11 budget approved under Article 3 of the May 11, 2010 Annual Town Meeting or take any other action relative thereto.

This article relates to addressing the current year (FY11) general fund budget. The intended funding will be inter/intra departmental transfers presented at the Annual Town Meeting.

Advisory Board Opinion to be Determined

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$50 to the Goodnow Book Expense Account for the purchase of books for the Library, as required by the terms of the Goodnow Deed of Gift, or take any other action relative thereto.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend Chapter IX of the General Bylaws as follows:

Delete in its entirety "Section 1. Disposition of Obsolete Personal Property: Any Board or officer in charge of a Town Department may, with the approval of the Selectmen, sell any obsolete or used machinery, materials or equipment no longer required for use by such Board or Department, or trade the same in part payment for replacements for which funds have been provided. (Adopted at the Annual Town Meeting, March 7, 1972)";

Re-title the existing Section 2 as Section 1;

or take any other action relative thereto.

Disposal of obsolete personal property must be conducted pursuant to Mass. General Law Chapter 30B.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract and accept any grants from the Mass. Department of Transportation-Highway Division for the construction of any road or related work that may be allotted to the Town for the ensuing year or to take any other action relative thereto.

This article authorizes the Selectmen to accept any grants or contracts with the state for road or road-related projects.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to either or both of the Town's Stabilization Funds (Infrastructure Stabilization Account #85-5-041-000 and General Stabilization Account #83-5-041-000) or take any other action relative thereto.

These accounts are the town's savings accounts. Infrastructure Stabilization is strictly used for future capital purchases, infrastructure improvements and projects. General Stabilization may be used for any lawful purpose. A 2/3rds vote is required to expend funds from either account.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to accept Section 20 of the Mass. General Laws Chapter 32B and to establish a separate fund known as the "Other Post Employment Benefits Liability Trust Fund" as authorized by said Sec. 20, which would enable the town: (a) to create a funding schedule for such fund, and (b) in future years to appropriate sums to reduce the unfunded actuarial liability of future retiree health benefit and other post-employment benefits, all in accordance with said statute, or take any action relative thereto.

Municipal governments are being required to examine funding future health insurance liabilities for retirees, similar to funding future pension obligations. This proposal would establish a dedicated fund for this purpose, in which all accrued interest would accumulate back into the fund.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to be deposited in the Other Post Employment Benefits Liability Trust Fund in order to offset future health insurance costs for retirees, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Adoption of this article will authorize a contribution to the fund established in the preceding article.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 32B, Section 18A which will require that all retirees who retire after the acceptance of this section, their spouses and dependents who are enrolled in Medicare Part A at no cost to a retiree, their spouse or dependents, or eligible for coverage thereunder at no cost to a retiree, his spouse or dependents, be required to enroll in a Medicare health benefits supplemental plan offered by the Town, or take any action in relation thereto.

Adoption of this article would require any future Medicare eligible retiree who wishes to continue health care benefits, be transferred to a Medicare Supplemental Health plan offered by the Town.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will accept the provisions of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 59, Section 5, Clause 54 exempting from taxation personal property accounts having a valuation of less than \$10,000.

Based on a study of operational costs the Assessors have determined that Personal Property accounts with less than \$10,000 valuation do not generate sufficient tax revenue to cover the cost of administering the account. Based on FY11 data, acceptance of this article would affect 88 of the 118 personal property accounts. Those 88 accounts produced \$3,800 in tax revenue.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$1,000 for town concerts, the expenditure of such funds to be authorized by the Board of Selectmen, or take any other action relative thereto.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept Mass. General Law Chapter 41 Section 19K, allowing for additional compensation for the Town Clerk upon certification and further, that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to fund this article or take any other action relative thereto.

Acceptance of this article awards the Town Clerk an additional annual stipend upon successful completion of the certification program administered by the Mass. Town Clerks' Association. The program is based on experience, education, and successfully passing an examination. The Town has previously accepted a similar statute awarding stipends to the Treasurer and the Tax Collector upon certification.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$2,200 for the Planning Board to fund the development of a concept plan for a Post Office Place Village District. The funds will be used to pay for staff time and expenses for assistance from the planning staff of the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning Commission (CMRPC).

Explanation: The foundation for this project is the Princeton Town Plan adopted in the 2007 Town Meeting. The ultimate goal will be to develop a village zoning bylaw for the area encompassing Post Office Place and surrounding area to be determined by the visioning/feasibility study. The Planning Board, in conjunction with CMRPC, will conduct public forums to gather public input, develop goals for the area, and define what changes might be needed to accomplish those goals. CMRPC will assist in leading the forums and provide technical assistance in evaluating the site. This is the initial step in the process of developing the bylaw.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$3,000 to purchase for use of the Library Department an Exterior Bookdrop and any related appurtenances, or take any action relative thereto.

The Library Department requests to expand its customer service by providing a secure, weatherproof, heavy-duty receptacle for the return of library materials that may be accessed on a "drive-thru" basis without leaving one's automobile.

Advisory Board Does Not Approve

ARTICLE 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$3,500 to continue the ongoing restoration of Meetinghouse Cemetery and historic grave stones threatened with erosion or to take any other action relative thereto.

This project was initially approved by TM in 2007. To date, 45 gravestones have been addressed and 70 more need work, much of it urgent. The Princeton Historical Commission will continue to solicit and employ volunteer efforts and will use this appropriation to help see this important task to completion.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, borrow or transfer from available funds the sum of \$50,000 to purchase for the use of the Highway Department a used dump truck or trucks and any related appurtenances, or take any action relative thereto.

The Highway Department seeks to modernize its fleet and replace a 1985 Mack dump truck that has reached the end of its useful life.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$5,000 to purchase for public safety purposes a replacement base radio and any related appurtenances, or take any action relative thereto.

The present base radio is twenty-five years old. This is a critical component of public safety communication that needs replacement.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$25,000 to fund any costs associated with a transition by the Town entering into a Regional Public Safety Dispatch System, or take any action relative thereto.

Regional Dispatch is a matter currently under investigation by the Public Safety Committee and the Board of Selectmen. The purpose of this article is to provide for potential costs related to integrating into a regional system. Any simultaneous savings gained by entering into such a system would be realized in the Salary account, and could not be accessed for this purpose without Town Meeting action

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$20,000 to purchase for the use of the Fire Department turnout gear, or take any action relative thereto.

This article represents 50% of the cost of replacing all the protective suits worn by firefighters. The Fire Department's present complement of these suits are at minimum ten years old. At present age they have become much less effective and safe. A similar article is planned for the May 2012 Annual Town Meeting Warrant to complete this replacement program.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$20,000 for mechanical and electrical improvements, and for painting of Ambulance A1.

This article addresses the Town's principal ambulance that was purchased in 2000. The planned work is the replacement of the engine, transmission, and electrical harness to improve vehicle reliability, and additionally, the painting necessary to comply with the state inspection process.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$40,000 to the Town Building Maintenance program to defray the costs for materials and repairs to town buildings, and further to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds a sum of money to continue the Grounds Maintenance program or take any other action relative thereto.

This article supports a program to repair, maintain and restore town buildings and grounds. This program will preserve and protect valuable town assets. These programs are for all town assets other than the Thomas Prince School and the Princeton Municipal Light Department.

Advisory Board Approves

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will transfer the a sum of \$8,000 from the Receipts Reserved for Appropriation-Cemetery Lots account to the Cemetery Maintenance Account for the care and improvement of the town cemeteries, including landscaping, stonewall repair, and equipment.

Mass. General Law Chapter 114, section 15 requires payments for lots to be deposited into a designated account to be used exclusively "for the cost of land, its care, improvement and embellishment, or the enlargement of the cemetery." These funds may be accessed only through appropriation by the Town Meeting.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof seven days at least before time of said meeting at Bagg Hall, Mechanics Hall and the Princeton Post Office.

Hereof fail not, and make return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of said meeting, as aforesaid.
