REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

On September 13th Chief Charles Schmohl retired from the Princeton Police Department (PPD) after forty years of service to the Town of Princeton. Chief Schmohl began his career in Princeton when he was appointed a part-time police officer January 1, 1969. In April 1977 he was promoted to part-time Sergeant and on January 1, 1988 the Selectmen appointed him full-time Chief of Police. Chief Schmohl leaves the PPD with an outstanding legacy including extensive success in grant writing that allowed the PPD to purchase new equipment critical to department operations. Chief Schmohl provided exceptional leadership and superb mentoring for young officers. I speak for the entire department, past and present, when I say thank you Chief for all your years of dedication, service and friendship to the Princeton Police Department. We will miss you greatly.

On September 13th John Chase was sworn in as a full-time police officer. John began his career in Princeton in March 2004 as a part-time dispatcher and in 2005 became a part-time police officer. We will lose John for a short time while he attends the Police Academy but we look forward to his return with great anticipation.

On October 31st Travis Russell was sworn in as a part-time police officer. Travis began his career in Princeton as a part-time dispatcher in September 2007. Congratulations Travis.

In December we received a State 9-1-1 Department Public Safety Answering Point and Regional Emergency Communication Center Support and Incentive Grant. We will use a portion of this grant to replace the dispatch center telephone system. Upon installation the phone system will provide PPD with a much-needed voicemail and mailbox system.



REPORT OF THE ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

In 2009 we had over one hundred sixty animal control calls that came through our dispatch center. This number does not include all of the follow-up calls to residents for unlicensed dogs, court discrepancies, and any other animal control calls needed.

The Town of Princeton licensed 839 dogs in 2009. Kennel fees, fines and unlicensed dog fines totaled \$820.00. I hope to license more dogs in 2010 than 2009 and assist the residents of Princeton in understanding and abiding by the dog restraint and regulation by-laws better. In April 2008, I was recertified as a level 1 Animal Control Officer through the National Animal Control Association. I think being certified is a good thing since a bill just passes in 2009 requiring all Animal Control Officers be certified under state law.
